

201 (NORTHERN) FIELD HOSPITAL

Raised in March 1909, as the 1st Northern General Hospital, with the Commissioning of the first nine officers in Armstrong College, Newcastle University. The first Commanding Officer was Lt Col Rutherford.

Deployed to France in 1917 as 59th Northern General Hospital. First established in the harbour area of Le Havre; then moved forward, first to Amiens then finally to St Omer.

1st October 1917, the unit suffered its only fatality during the war; Pte Cyril Vincent Holden. He was killed in an air raid on the hospital.

Hospital returned to England and demobilised in 1919.

During World War 2, as 4th Northern General Hospital the unit covered the withdrawal from Dunkirk, situated in Dieppe. The Unit recovered to England from the Dunkirk bridgehead.

In 1943, 4th Northern General Hospital deployed to Egypt where it remained for the remainder of the war.

The hospital deployed 32 personnel to Op GRANBY (first Gulf War) in 1990/91. A further 80 personnel deployed in support of Op TELIC 1 in 2003.

The unit provided the core of the Camp Bastion R3 Medical Facility in support of Op HERRICK 7a, 2007/08; 58 unit personnel deployed. This was followed by a further a tour in 2012 to Op HERRICK 15b, during which 50 unit personnel deployed.

The unit celebrated its Centenary in 2009. A commemorative stone was laid in Leazes Park, Newcastle upon Tyne, to mark the event. This was followed by a Centenary Dinner in Durham Castle and a Battlefield Study in St Omer. The final part of the celebrations was when the Commanding Officer led a party to a wreath laying ceremony at the grave of Pte Holden on 1 Oct 09.

After Op HERRICK 15b deployment the unit has enjoyed overseas exercises in Italy in 2013 and California in 2014.

Under the command of Colonel CJ Townend RRC RAMC the unit is currently transitioning towards the concept of the high readiness Vanguard field hospital which will be exercised later in 2015.
